То	authorize the President to provide assistance to the Governments of Haiti and Armenia to reverse the effects of deforestation, and for other purposes.
1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Haiti and Armenia
5	Reforestation Act of 2018".
6	SEC. 2. FINDINGS; PURPOSE.
7	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

1	(1) the established policy of the Federal Gov-
2	ernment is to support and seek the protection of for-
3	ests around the world, which provide a wide range
4	of benefits by—
5	(A) harboring a major portion of the bio-
6	logical and terrestrial resources of Earth;
7	(B) providing habitats for almost ½ of all
8	species on Earth, including species essential to
9	medical research and agricultural productivity;
10	(C) contributing to the livelihood of more
11	than 1,600,000,000 people through access to
12	food, fresh water, clothing, traditional medi-
13	cines, and shelter;
14	(D) ensuring environmental services, such
15	as biodiversity, water conservation, soil enrich-
16	ment, water supply management, and climate
17	regulation; and
18	(E) absorbing and storing carbon dioxide,
19	as deforestation accounts for approximately 12
20	percent of the global anthropogenic greenhouse
21	gas emissions that contribute to global warm-
22	ing;
23	(2) while forests cover a little less than ½ of
24	the land area on Earth, approximately 85 percent of

1	Earth's original primary forests have been de-
2	stroyed, degraded, or fragmented;
3	(3) in Haiti—
4	(A) the destruction of forests began cen-
5	turies ago, when 17th century colonists cut
6	down trees for lumber, fuel, and furniture;
7	(B) the 18th century plantation economy
8	resulted in hillsides near towns being stripped
9	of trees;
10	(C) after gaining independence, deforest-
11	ation continued as Haiti rebuilt its local econ-
12	omy by growing coffee and exporting timber;
13	(D) in 1923, more than 60 percent of the
14	land was forested, but by the 1940s and 1950s
15	deforestation was accelerating as an increasing
16	population put more pressure on forests;
17	(E) in recent years, urbanization has ex-
18	panded exponentially and growing cities have
19	depended on charcoal produced by cutting down
20	trees in the countryside;
21	(F) poor forestry and land use policies by
22	the Government of Haiti has exacerbated defor-
23	estation, and by 2014, forest cover had de-
24	creased to approximately 9 to 11 percent of the
25	country; and

1	(G) between 2000 and 2016, 5,430 hec-
2	tares of forest cover were lost, equal to 6.3 per-
3	cent of Haiti's tree cover;
4	(4) in Armenia—
5	(A) while archeological data indicated that
6	approximately 35 percent of the country was
7	originally forested—
8	(i) less than 12 percent of the country
9	was covered in forest in 1990; and
10	(ii) less than 6 percent of the country
11	was covered in forest by 2016; and
12	(B) in August, 2017, a fire caused signifi-
13	cant damage to the Khosrov Forest, which is
14	among the world's oldest protected areas, en-
15	gulfing more than 2,733 hectares in flames and
16	causing substantial harm to hundreds of unique
17	plant species;
18	(5) economic pressures, resulting from more
19	than 60 percent of the population of Haiti living
20	below the poverty line and 29.8 percent of the popu-
21	lation of Armenia living below the poverty line—
22	(A) are factors contributing to the defor-
23	estation of Haiti and Armenia; and
24	(B) are manifested particularly through
25	the cutting of areas of forest for conversion to

1	agricultural and commercial uses, where wood
2	and charcoal produced from cutting down trees
3	accounts for a major supply toward Haiti's and
4	Armenia's energy sectors;
5	(6) forests provide cover to soften the effect of
6	heavy rains and reduce erosion by anchoring the soil
7	with tree roots;
8	(7) a significant effect of the deforestation in
9	Haiti and Armenia is soil erosion, which has—
10	(A) lowered the productivity on the land
11	due to the leaching of nutrients in topsoils;
12	(B) worsened the severity of droughts and
13	the effects of landslides and floods;
14	(C) led to further deforestation due to
15	slash and burn practices when eroded areas are
16	no longer productive;
17	(D) increased the pressure on the remain-
18	ing land and trees in Haiti and Armenia; and
19	(E) significantly decreased water quality
20	and the quantity of freshwater and clean drink-
21	ing water available to populations;
22	(8) research strongly suggests that deforest-
23	ation increases the risk of infectious diseases, includ-
24	ing malaria, dengue fever, SARS, Ebola,
25	Hantavirus, and Zika—

1	(A) by depriving insect and animal carriers
2	of habitat; and
3	(B) by directly increasing their rate of ex-
4	posure to human populations who are suscep-
5	tible to zoonotic pathogens;
6	(9) both Haiti and Armenia have faced natural
7	disasters in recent years, the effects of which have
8	been exacerbated by deforestation, such as—
9	(A) flooding in Armenia that has swept
10	away or damaged thousands of homes, schools,
11	health clinics, and other institutions, partly be-
12	cause of damage to forests through illegal log-
13	ging, landslides, and soil erosion;
14	(B) hurricanes in Haiti that have killed
15	thousands and displaced hundreds of thousands
16	more, partly because the clearing of large hill-
17	sides enabled rainwater to run off directly into
18	settlements located at the bottom of slopes,
19	causing severe flooding; and
20	(C) the January 2010 earthquake in Haiti,
21	which destroyed much of the infrastructure of
22	Port-au-Prince, reduced hillside stability and in-
23	creased the likelihood of mudslides, soil erosion,
24	and flooding factors, which negatively impacted

1	the water supply and heightened concerns for
2	the spread of waterborne diseases;
3	(10) economic benefits for local communities
4	from sustainable uses of forests are critical for the
5	long-term sustainable management of forests in
6	Haiti and Armenia;
7	(11) for fiscal years 2015, 2017, and 2018,
8	Congress appropriated funding for market-based re-
9	forestation programs in Haiti which have resulted in
10	successful agroforestry activities, increasing crop
11	production and profit, as well as tree cover; and
12	(12) reforestation efforts would provide new
13	sources of jobs, income, and investments in Haiti
14	and Armenia by—
15	(A) providing employment opportunities in
16	tree seedling programs, contract tree planting
17	and management, sustainable agricultural ini-
18	tiatives, sustainable and managed timber har-
19	vesting, and wood products milling and fin-
20	ishing services; and
21	(B) enhancing community enterprises that
22	generate income through the trading of sustain-
23	able forest resources, many of which exist on
24	small scales.

1	(b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to provide
2	assistance to the Government of Haiti and the Govern-
3	ment of Armenia to develop and implement, or improve,
4	nationally appropriate policies and actions—
5	(1) to reduce deforestation and forest degrada-
6	tion, and improve forest management and natural
7	regeneration;
8	(2) to increase annual rates of afforestation and
9	reforestation in a sustainable, measurable, report-
10	able, and verifiable manner;
11	(3) to restore social and economic conditions for
12	the environmental recovery of the forest cover of
13	Haiti and Armenia to at least 7 percent of total land
14	mass in Haiti and 12 percent of total land mass in
15	Armenia (as determined under section 302(a)) not
16	later than 10 years after the date of the enactment
17	of this Act; and
18	(4) to improve sustainable resource manage-
19	ment at the watershed level.
20	SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
21	In this Act:
22	(1) AFFORESTATION.—The term
23	"afforestation"—

1	(A) means the establishment of a new for-
2	est through the planting of trees on a parcel of
3	land not previously forested; and
4	(B) includes—
5	(i) the introduction of a tree species
6	to a parcel of nonforested land in which
7	the species is not a native species; and
8	(ii) the increase of tree cover through
9	plantations.
10	(2) Agroforestry.—
11	(A) IN GENERAL.—The term "agro-
12	forestry" means systems in which perennial
13	trees or shrubs—
14	(i) are integrated with crops or live-
15	stock; and
16	(ii) constitute a minimum 10 percent
17	of ground cover.
18	(B) Inclusion.—Actual forest cover re-
19	sulting from agroforestry programs may be
20	counted toward the total forest cover goal set
21	forth in section (2)(b)(3).
22	(3) Appropriate committees of con-
23	GRESS.—The term "appropriate committees of Con-
24	gress'' means—

1	(A) the Committee on Foreign Relations of
2	the Senate;
3	(B) the Committee on Appropriations of
4	the Senate;
5	(C) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of
6	the House of Representatives; and
7	(D) the Committee on Appropriations of
8	the House of Representatives.
9	(4) Deforestation.—The term "deforest-
10	ation" means—
11	(A) the conversion of forest to another
12	land use; or
13	(B) the long-term reduction of the tree
14	canopy.
15	(5) Forest.—The term "forest"—
16	(A) except as provided in subparagraph
17	(B), means a terrestrial ecosystem containing
18	native tree species generated and maintained
19	primarily through natural ecological and evolu-
20	tionary processes, which spans more than 0.5
21	hectares with trees higher than 5 meters and a
22	canopy cover of more than 10 percent or trees
23	able to reach these thresholds in situ; and
24	(B) does not include—

1	(i) plantations, such as crops of trees
2	planted primarily by humans for the pur-
3	poses of harvesting; or
4	(ii) land that is predominantly under
5	agricultural or urban land use.
6	(6) Reforestation.—The term "reforest-
7	ation"—
8	(A) means the establishment of forest on
9	lands that were previously considered as forest,
10	but which have been deforested; and
11	(B) includes the increase of tree cover
12	through plantations.
13	TITLE I—FORESTATION AND WA-
14	TERSHED MANAGEMENT AS-
15	SISTANCE TO THE GOVERN-
16	MENT OF HAITI AND THE
17	GOVERNMENT OF ARMENIA
18	SEC. 101. FORESTATION ASSISTANCE.
19	(a) Authority.—
20	(1) In general.—In accordance with section
21	118 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22
22	U.S.C. 2151p-1) and consistent with paragraph (2),
23	the President is authorized to provide financial as-
24	-i-t
	sistance, technology transfers, or capacity-building

1	Government of Armenia for activities to develop and
2	implement 1 or more forestation proposals described
3	in paragraph (2)—
4	(A) to reduce the deforestation of Haiti or
5	Armenia; and
6	(B) to increase the rates of afforestation
7	and reforestation in Haiti or Armenia.
8	(2) Proposals.—
9	(A) IN GENERAL.—Assistance may be pro-
10	vided under this section to the Government of
11	Haiti and to the Government of Armenia to im-
12	plement 1 or more proposals submitted by ei-
13	ther country that contain—
14	(i) a description of each policy and
15	initiative to be carried out with such as-
16	sistance;
17	(ii) adequate documentation to ensure,
18	as determined by the President, that—
19	(I) each policy and initiative—
20	(aa) will be carried out and
21	managed in accordance with
22	widely-accepted, environmentally-
23	sustainable forestry and agricul-
24	tural practices; and

1	(bb) will be designed and
2	implemented in a manner that
3	improves the governance of for-
4	ests by building local capacity to
5	be transparent, inclusive, ac-
6	countable, and coordinated in de-
7	cision-making processes and the
8	implementation of the policy or
9	initiative; and
10	(II) the proposals will further es-
11	tablish and enforce legal regimes,
12	standards, and safeguards designed to
13	ensure that members of local commu-
14	nities in affected areas, as partners
15	and primary stakeholders, will be en-
16	gaged in the design, planning, imple-
17	mentation, monitoring, and evaluation
18	of the policies and initiatives; and
19	(iii) a description of how the proposal
20	supports and aids forest restoration efforts
21	in accordance with the purpose set forth in
22	section 2(b).
23	(B) Determination of compatibility
24	WITH CERTAIN PROGRAMS.—In evaluating each
25	proposal submitted under subparagraph (A),

1	the President shall ensure that each policy and
2	initiative described in such proposal is compat-
3	ible with—
4	(i) broader development, poverty alle-
5	viation, sustainable energy usage, and nat-
6	ural resource conservation objectives and
7	initiatives in Haiti or in Armenia;
8	(ii) the development, poverty allevi-
9	ation, disaster risk management, and cli-
10	mate resilience programs of the United
11	States Agency for International Develop-
12	ment, including program involving tech-
13	nical support from the United States For-
14	est Service; and
15	(iii) activities of international organi-
16	zations and multilateral development
17	banks.
18	(b) Eligible Activities.—Any assistance received
19	by the Government of Haiti or by the Government of Ar-
20	menia under subsection (a)(1) shall be conditional upon
21	the development and implementation of a proposal sub-
22	mitted under subsection (a)(2), which may include—
23	(1) the provision of technologies and associated
24	support for activities to reduce deforestation or in-

1	crease afforestation and reforestation rates, includ-
2	ing—
3	(A) fire reduction initiatives;
4	(B) sustainable land use management ini-
5	tiatives;
6	(C) initiatives to increase agricultural pro-
7	ductivity;
8	(D) forest law enforcement initiatives;
9	(E) the development of timber tracking
10	systems;
11	(F) the development of cooking fuel sub-
12	stitutes;
13	(G) tree-planting initiatives; and
14	(H) programs that are designed to focus
15	on market-based solutions to reduce deforest-
16	ation and increase reforestation and
17	afforestation, including programs that leverage
18	the international carbon-offset market;
19	(2) the enhancement and expansion of govern-
20	mental and nongovernmental institutional capacity
21	to effectively design and implement a proposal devel-
22	oped under subsection (a)(2) through initiatives, in-
23	cluding—
24	(A) the establishment of transparent, ac-
25	countable, and inclusive decision-making proc-

1	esses relating to all stakeholders (including af-
2	fected local communities);
3	(B) the promotion of enhanced coordina-
4	tion among ministries and agencies responsible
5	for agro-ecological zoning, mapping, land plan-
6	ning and permitting, sustainable agriculture,
7	forestry, mining, and law enforcement; and
8	(C) the clarification of land tenure and re-
9	source rights of affected communities, including
10	local communities;
11	(3) the development and support of institutional
12	capacity to measure, verify, and report the activities
13	carried out by the Government of Haiti and by the
14	Government of Armenia to reduce deforestation and
15	increase afforestation and reforestation rates
16	through the use of appropriate methods, including—
17	(A) the use of best practices and tech-
18	nologies to monitor land use change in Haiti
19	and in Armenia, and changes in the extent of
20	natural forest cover, protected areas,
21	mangroves, agroforestry, and agriculture;
22	(B) the monitoring of the impacts of poli-
23	cies and initiatives on—
24	(i) affected communities;

1	(ii) the biodiversity of the environment
2	of Haiti and Armenia; and
3	(iii) the health of the forests of Haiti
4	and Armenia; and
5	(C) independent and participatory forest
6	monitoring; and
7	(4) the development of and coordination with
8	watershed restoration programs in Haiti and Arme-
9	nia, including—
10	(A) agreements between the Government of
11	Haiti or the Government of Armenia and non-
12	governmental organizations or private sector
13	partners to provide technical assistance, capac-
14	ity building, or technology transfers which sup-
15	port the environmental recovery of Haiti's and
16	Armenia's watersheds through forest restora-
17	tion activities if such assistance will—
18	(i) strengthen economic drivers of sus-
19	tainable resource inventory mapping and
20	management;
21	(ii) reduce environmental vulner-
22	ability; or
23	(iii) improve governance, planning,
24	and community action of watersheds in
25	Haiti and Armenia;

1	(B) actions to support economic incentives
2	for sustainable resource management, including
3	enhanced incentives for the replacement of an-
4	nual hillside cropping with perennial and non-
5	erosive production systems;
6	(C) enhanced extension services supporting
7	the sustainable intensification of agriculture to
8	increase farmer incomes and reduce pressure on
9	degraded land; and
10	(D) investments in watershed infrastruc-
11	ture to reduce environmental vulnerability, in-
12	cluding the establishment of appropriate erosion
13	control measures through reforestation activi-
14	ties in targeted watersheds or sub-watersheds.
15	(c) Development of Performance Metrics.—
16	(1) In general.—If the President provides as-
17	sistance to the Government of Haiti or the Govern-
18	ment of Armenia under subsection (a)(1), the Presi-
19	dent, in cooperation with such government, shall de-
20	velop appropriate performance metrics to measure,
21	verify, and report—
22	(A) the implementation of each policy and
23	initiative to be carried out by the Government
24	of Haiti or the Government of Armenia, as the
25	case may be;

1	(B) the progress of each policy and initia-
2	tive with respect to the forests of Haiti and Ar-
3	menia; and
4	(C) impacts of reforestation policies and
5	initiatives on the local communities of Haiti and
6	Armenia.
7	(2) Requirements.—Performance metrics de-
8	veloped under paragraph (1) shall include, to the
9	maximum extent practicable, short-term and long-
10	term metrics to evaluate the implementation of each
11	policy and initiative contained in each proposal de-
12	veloped under subsection (a)(2).
13	(d) Reports.—
14	(1) Initial report.—Not later than 18
15	months after the date of the enactment of this Act,
16	the President shall submit a report to the appro-
17	priate committees of Congress that describes the ac-
18	tions the President has taken, or plans to take—
19	(A) to engage with the Government of
20	Haiti and the Government of Armenia, non-
21	governmental stakeholders, civil society, and
22	public and private nonprofit organizations to
23	implement this section: and

1	(B) to enter into agreements with the Gov-
2	ernment of Haiti and with the Government of
3	Armenia under subsection (a)(1).
4	(2) BIENNIAL REPORTS.—Not later than 2
5	years after the date on which the President first
6	provides assistance to the Government of Haiti or
7	the Government of Armenia under subsection $(a)(1)$,
8	and biennially thereafter, the President shall submit
9	a report to the appropriate committees of Congress
10	that describes the progress made by the Government
11	of Haiti and by the Government of Armenia in im-
12	plementing each policy and initiative contained in
13	the proposal submitted by each such government
14	under subsection (a)(2).
15	(e) Additional Assistance.—
16	(1) In general.—The President is authorized
17	to provide financial and other assistance to the Gov-
18	ernment of Haiti, the Government of Armenia, local
19	government bodies, or nongovernmental organiza-
20	tions—
21	(A) to provide information to local commu-
22	nities relating to each policy and initiative to be
23	carried out by the Government of Haiti or by
24	the Government of Armenia with assistance
25	made available under subsection (a)(1);

1	(B) to promote effective participation by
2	local communities in the design, implementa-
3	tion, and independent monitoring of each policy
4	and initiative;
5	(C) to promote, in support of sustainable
6	forestation activities, enhanced watershed gov-
7	ernance, national planning, and community ac-
8	tion programs that increase—
9	(i) the development of national water-
10	shed management policies for Haiti and
11	for Armenia by the appropriate govern-
12	ment ministries and agencies;
13	(ii) the establishment of an effective
14	forum for donor coordination related to
15	management and reforestation in Haiti
16	and Armenia;
17	(iii) support for the Centre National
18	de l'Information Géo-Spatiale (CNIGS),
19	the Center for Ecological-Noosphere Stud-
20	ies (CENS), and the United States Forest
21	Service to provide technology, data, and
22	monitoring support for improved watershed
23	and forest resource management at a na-
24	tional scale in Haiti and in Armenia; and

1	(iv) development of effective govern-
2	ance structures in Haiti and in Armenia
3	for stakeholder engagement, coordination
4	of approaches, land use planning, and dis-
5	aster mitigation at the watershed scale;
6	and
7	(D) to meet the goals of this Act.
8	(2) TERMINATION OF DIRECT FUNDING.—If the
9	President determines that the goals of this Act are
10	not being appropriately and efficiently met with the
11	assistance provided under this section, the President
12	may terminate such assistance to either the Govern-
13	ment of Haiti or the Government of Armenia, as ap-
14	propriate.
15	(f) MINIMUM COUNTRY REFORESTATION FUND PER-
16	CENTAGE.—Not less than 85 percent of amounts provided
17	for programs under this section shall be spent on actual
18	reforestation activities in Haiti and Armenia, which may
19	include the protection of reforested areas.
20	(g) Sunset.—
21	(1) In general.—The authority under this
22	section shall terminate on the date that is 10 years
23	after the date of the enactment of this Act, or the
24	date that is 10 years after an extension under para-

1	graph (2), unless the President certifies to the ap-
2	propriate committees of Congress that—
3	(A) effective and sustainable programs are
4	in place through the Government of Haiti, the
5	Government of Armenia, or local governments
6	in Haiti or in Armenia, in potential partnership
7	with international donors, nongovernmental or-
8	ganizations, or civil society groups, to protect
9	and manage areas reforested with assistance
10	provided under this Act; and
11	(B) additional time is necessary to accom-
12	plish the goals of this Act.
13	(2) Extensions.—If a certification is made
14	under paragraph (1), the authority under this sec-
15	tion shall be extended for an additional 10-year
16	term. Not more than 2 extensions are permitted
17	under this paragraph.
18	TITLE II—GRANTS FOR
19	REFORESTATION
20	SEC. 201. REFORESTATION GRANT PROGRAM.
21	(a) Establishment.—The President is authorized
22	to establish a grant program to carry out the purpose de-
23	scribed in section 2(b), including reversing deforestation
24	and improving reforestation and afforestation in Haiti and
25	in Armenia.

1	(b) Grants Authorized.—
2	(1) In general.—The President is authorized
3	to award grants and contracts, for a period not to
4	exceed 3 years, to carry out projects that, in the ag-
5	gregate, reverse deforestation and improve reforest-
6	ation and afforestation in Haiti or in Armenia.
7	(2) Maximum amount.—
8	(A) In general.—Except as provided in
9	subparagraph (B), the President may not
10	award a grant under this section in an amount
11	greater than \$500,000 per year.
12	(B) Exception.—The President may
13	award a grant under this section in an amount
14	greater than \$500,000 per year if the President
15	determines that the recipient of the grant has
16	demonstrated success with respect to a project
17	that was funded under this section.
18	(c) Use of Funds.—
19	(1) In general.—Grants awarded pursuant to
20	subsection (b) may be used—
21	(A) to provide a financial incentive to pro-
22	tect forests;
23	(B) to provide hands-on management and
24	oversight of replanting efforts;

1	(C) to support sustainable, income-gener-
2	ating, forest-related economic growth;
3	(D) to provide—
4	(i) seed money to start cooperative re-
5	forestation and afforestation efforts; and
6	(ii) subsequent conditional funding for
7	such efforts contingent upon required tree
8	care and maintenance activities;
9	(E) to promote the widespread use of—
10	(i) improved cooking stove tech-
11	nologies that do not involve the harvesting
12	of forest growth; and
13	(ii) other renewable fuel technologies
14	that reduce deforestation and improve
15	human health; and
16	(F) securing the involvement and commit-
17	ment of local communities—
18	(i) to protect forests in existence as of
19	the date of the enactment of this Act; and
20	(ii) to partner in and carry out
21	afforestation and reforestation activities.
22	(2) Local community participation.—Ac-
23	tivities to secure the participation of local commu-
24	nities under paragraph (1)(F) should include 1 or
25	more of the following activities:

1	(A) Creation of local jobs involving estab-
2	lishing, protecting, and managing reforested
3	areas.
4	(B) Collaboration to analyze biodiversity
5	and ecosystem services integral to sustainability
6	and business decisions.
7	(C) Cooperative conservation programs, in-
8	cluding—
9	(i) working with local water sources to
10	ensure clean water through improved
11	forestland and watershed; or
12	(ii) working with food suppliers to en-
13	sure sustainable agroforestry products.
14	(3) Consistency with proposals.—To the
15	maximum extent practicable, projects using grant
16	funds shall support, and be consistent with, the pro-
17	posal developed under section 101(a)(2) that is the
18	subject of the project.
19	(d) Application.—
20	(1) In general.—An entity desiring a grant
21	under this section shall submit an application at
22	such time, in such manner, and containing such in-
23	formation as the President may reasonably require.
24	(2) Content.—Each application submitted
25	under paragraph (1)—

1	(A) should be consistent with the findings,
2	recommendations, and ongoing work relating
3	to—
4	(i) the United States Agency for
5	International Development Haiti Reforest-
6	ation Project for Haiti; or
7	(ii) the 2009 United States Agency
8	for International Development report enti-
9	tled "Biodiversity Analysis Update for Ar-
10	menia Final Report: Prosperity, Liveli-
11	hoods, and Conserving Ecosystems
12	(PLACE) IQC Task Order #4"; and
13	(B) shall include—
14	(i) a description of the objectives to be
15	attained;
16	(ii) a description of the manner in
17	which grant funds will be used;
18	(iii) a plan for evaluating the success
19	of the project based on verifiable evidence;
20	and
21	(iv) to the extent that the applicant
22	intends to use nonnative species in
23	afforestation efforts—

1	(I) an explanation of the benefit
2	of using nonnative species rather than
3	native species; and
4	(II) verification that the species
5	to be used are not invasive.
6	(3) Preference for certain projects.—In
7	awarding grants under this section, preference shall
8	be given to applicants that propose—
9	(A) to develop market-based solutions to
10	the challenges of reforestation in Haiti and Ar-
11	menia, including the use of conditional cash
12	transfers and similar financial incentives to pro-
13	tect reforestation efforts;
14	(B) to partner with local communities and
15	cooperatives; and
16	(C) to focus on efforts that build local ca-
17	pacity to sustain growth after the completion of
18	the underlying grant project.
19	(e) Dissemination of Information.—The Presi-
20	dent shall collect and widely disseminate information
21	about the effectiveness of the demonstration projects as-
22	sisted under this section.
23	SEC. 202. FOREST PROTECTION PROGRAMS.
24	Chapter 7 of part I of the Foreign Assistance Act
25	of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2281 et seq.) is amended—

1	(1) by redesignating sections 461 through 466
2	as sections 471 through 476, respectively; and
3	(2) by adding at the end the following:
4	"SEC. 477. PILOT PROGRAM FOR HAITI.
5	"(a) Submission of List of Areas of Severely
6	DEGRADED NATURAL RESOURCES.—The President, in co-
7	operation with nongovernmental conservation organiza-
8	tions, shall invite the Government of Haiti to submit a
9	list of areas within Haiti in which forests are seriously
10	degraded or threatened.
11	"(b) Review of List.—The President shall—
12	"(1) analyze the areas on the list submitted by
13	the Government of Haiti under subsection (a); and
14	"(2) seek to reach an agreement with the Gov-
15	ernment of Haiti to assist with the restoration and
16	future sustainable use of such areas.
17	"(c) Grant Program.—
18	"(1) Grants authorized.—The President is
19	authorized to award grants to nongovernmental or-
20	ganizations, on such terms and conditions as may be
21	necessary, for the purchase on the open market of
22	discounted debt of the Government of Haiti, if a
23	market is determined to be viable, in exchange for
24	commitments by the Government of Haiti—

1	"(A) to restore forests identified pursuant
2	to subsection (a); or
3	"(B) to develop plans for sustainable use
4	of such forests.
5	"(2) Management of protected areas.—
6	Each recipient of a grant under this subsection shall
7	participate in the ongoing management of the area
8	or areas protected pursuant to such grant.
9	"(3) Matching of Grant Funds.—Any
10	United States funding provided to a nongovern-
11	mental organization under this subsection should be
12	matched by an equal or greater amount of funding
13	from the nongovernmental organization. Such
14	matching funds may include funding provided by
15	other international donors, nongovernmental organi-
16	zations, philanthropic bodies, corporations or other
17	private entities, institutions of higher learning, the
18	Government of Haiti, or other non-United States
19	Government sources.
20	"(4) MINIMUM COUNTRY REFORESTATION
21	FUND PERCENTAGE.—Not less than 85 percent of
22	grant funds provided under this subsection shall be
23	spent on actual reforestation activities in Haiti,
24	which may include the protection of reforested areas.

1	"(5) RETENTION OF PROCEEDS.—Notwith-
2	standing any other provision of law, a grantee (or
3	any subgrantee) under this subsection may retain,
4	without deposit in the Treasury of the United States
5	and without further appropriation by Congress—
6	"(A) interest earned on the proceeds of
7	any resulting debt-for-nature exchange pending
8	the disbursements of such proceeds; and
9	"(B) interest for approved program pur-
10	poses, which may include the establishment of
11	an endowment, the income of which is used for
12	such purposes.
13	"(6) Sunset.—
14	"(A) In General.—The authority to
15	award grants under this subsection shall termi-
16	nate on the date that is 5 years after the date
17	of the enactment of this Act unless the Presi-
18	dent determines and certifies to Congress
19	that—
20	"(i) the grant program under this
21	subsection has been effective in meeting
22	the goals of the Haiti and Armenia Refor-
23	estation Act of 2018; and

1	"(ii) the Government of Haiti has
2	committed to returning land in Haiti to
3	long-term sustainable forests.
4	"(B) Renewal.—If the President makes a
5	certification under subparagraph (A), the au-
6	thority to award grants under this subsection
7	may be renewed for 1 additional 5-year period.
8	"SEC. 478. PILOT PROGRAM FOR ARMENIA.
9	"(a) Submission of List of Areas of Severely
10	DEGRADED NATURAL RESOURCES.—The President, in co-
11	operation with nongovernmental conservation organiza-
12	tions, shall invite the Government of Armenia to submit
13	a list of areas within the territory of Armenia in which
14	forests are seriously degraded or threatened.
15	"(b) Review of List.—The President shall—
16	"(1) analyze the areas on the list submitted by
17	the Government of Armenia under subsection (a);
18	and
19	"(2) seek to reach an agreement with the Gov-
20	ernment of Armenia for the restoration and future
21	sustainable use of such areas.
22	"(c) Debt Forgiveness Agreement.—
23	"(1) Debt forgiveness.—The President is
24	authorized to forgive debt owed to the United States

1	by the Government of Armenia in exchange for com-
2	mitments by the Government of Armenia—
3	"(A) to restore forests identified by the
4	Government under subsection (a); or
5	"(B) to develop plans for sustainable use
6	of such forests.
7	"(2) Management of protected areas.—
8	The Government of Armenia shall participate in the
9	ongoing management of the area or areas protected
10	pursuant to such debt relief.
11	"(3) Minimum country reforestation
12	FUND PERCENTAGE.—Not less than 85 percent of
13	funds that qualify under a debt relief agreement
14	under this section shall be spent on actual reforest-
15	ation activities in Armenia, which may include the
16	protection of reforested areas or of existing forests.
17	"(4) Termination of Program.—
18	"(A) IN GENERAL.—The authority to offer
19	debt relief under this subsection shall terminate
20	on the date that is 5 years after the date of the
21	enactment of this Act unless the President de-
22	termines and certifies to Congress that—
23	"(i) the debt forgiveness pilot pro-
24	gram under this subsection has been effec-

1	tive in meeting the goals of the Haiti and
2	Armenia Reforestation Act of 2018; and
3	"(ii) the Government of Armenia has
4	committed to returning land in Armenia to
5	long-term sustainable forests.
6	"(B) Renewal.—If the President makes a
7	certification under subparagraph (A), the au-
8	thority to forgive debt under this subsection
9	may be renewed for 1 additional 5-year pe-
10	riod.".
11	TITLE III—ADMINISTRATIVE
12	PROVISION
13	SEC. 301. DELEGATION.
14	The President, or the Administrator of the United
15	States Agency for International Development or the Sec-
16	retary of State, acting as the President's delegate, may
17	draw on the expertise of the United States Forest Service
18	and the United States Agency for International Develop-
19	ment in designing and implementing programs under this
20	Act relating to reforestation, watershed restoration, and
21	monitoring of land use change.
22	SEC. 302. DETERMINATION AND MONITORING OF FOREST
23	LEVELS.
24	(a) In General.—Not later than 6 months after the
25	date of the enactment of this Act, the Chief of the United

1	States Forest Service, in consultation with the Adminis-
2	trator of the United States Agency for International De-
3	velopment, using the latest available Landsat data, shall—
4	(1) determine the current level of forest cover
5	in Haiti and the current level of forest cover in Ar-
6	menia, expressed as a percentage of each country's
7	total land mass; and
8	(2) submit this information to the appropriate
9	committees of Congress.
10	(b) UPDATES.—The Chief of the United States For-
11	est Service, in consultation with the Administrator of the
12	United States Agency for International Development, shall
13	submit an annual report to the appropriate committees of
14	Congress that contains an updated determination, using
15	the latest available Landsat data, of the level of forest
16	cover in Haiti and the level of forest cover in Armenia.
17	(c) Use of Determinations.—Each determination
18	under subsection (a)(1) and each updated determination
19	under subsection (b) shall be used for the purposes of set-
20	ting and achieving the goals described in section 2(b)(3).
