Hereby issues this Executive Declaration

in Observance of

APRIL 24, 1986

AS ARMENIAN MARTYRS DAY

The year 1986 marks the 71st anniversary of the genocide of the Armenian people people teated by the government of the Turkish Ottoman Empire in 1915, luring World War I. More than 1,500,000 Armenians were massacred or starved and many more were forced to flee from their homeland.

The Armenians are an ancient people, having settled in the vicinity of Tount Arment in the seventh century B.C. The Armenian Apostolic church was established in the foorth century A.D., making Armenia one of the first Christian nations. Armenians have always individed in the principles of freedom of conscience and religion.

Today, as free people of the United States, Armenian Arabon in the passion is thereby, freedom and peace with other nations. As a community, they have contributed to one quality of life in every profession, the arts, religion, and government.

We have learned a lasting lesson from the genocide of the Armenian prople. They lichard die in vain, but rather serve as a continual source of direction and corpose for all who demayle for humanity and equal rights. The time has come for all people regardless of color, exced, or ethnic origin to exercise a moral conscience by assisting those who need help.

Therefore, I, James J. Blanchard, Governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby declare April 24, 1986, as ARMENIAN MARTYRS DAY in Michigan. Large all citizens to join with the in a moment of reflection for the Armenian people who lost their lives and to join in a steadfast commitment to work for the peace and harmony of our world for future generations.
