MAYOR ROBERT SABONJIAN'S **PROCLAMATION**

Text of Mayor Robert Sabonian's Proclamation for Wankegan, Illinois

WHEREAS, fifty years ago, on April 24, 1915, the Government of Turkey ordered the commemcement of a systematic plan of mas-ssacre of the Armenian nation which before its termination was to take the awful toll of 1,000,000 lives, with an additional 1,000,000 displaced, ill and in want, marked forever by the terrible experiences of the first modern genocide which on the confession of Adolf Hitler
